We don't know what was going on in Hazel's mind, but we can certainly attest that Pastor Coe was captivating her.



## ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission

What do Mitchell, Savannah, Bryce and Hannah have in common? They are four young people from our Synod who have committed the next year of their life to serving in ministry around the world. They are doing this through the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission program (YAGM). The ELCA carries out many exciting and crucial ministries. One of the ELCA ministries that I especially appreciate is gthe YAGM program.

This month (September 2015), 74 young adults, who have just graduated from college, will begin working as volunteers in ELCA related ministries in Argentina, Cambodia, Columbia, Central Europe, Jerusalem/West Bank, Madagascar, Mexico, Rwanda, South Africa and the United Kingdom. They will be engaged in a variety of activities, including congregational ministry, human rights work, development projects, healthcare, education and youth work.

The four YAGM workers from our Synod are:



Mitchell Helton, Pacific Lutheran University, Tacoma, who will do educational and parish ministry in Jerusalem/West Bank.



Hannah Webber, Pacific Lutheran University, Tacoma, who will do youth and parish ministry in Knowle, United Kingdom.



Savannah Schneider, Pacific Lutheran University, Tacoma, who will do development work and teach English in Bavel, Columbia.



Bryce Knutzen, Good Shepherd Lutheran, Olympia, who will do youth ministry in Tollesbury, United Kingdom.

In addition to giving a year of their time and energy, YAGM volunteers also raise \$4,000 to help pay for their living costs of food, housing and transportation. The ELCA recruits sponsors who help provide the additional \$7,000 for living costs.

Along with the important ministry they do during their year of YAGM service, these young people return to church life in the United States with increased gifts of wisdom, spiritual insight and commitment to service. Many YAGM's become lay leaders in local congregations and a significant percentage enter seminary.

I invite you to offer prayers of thanksgiving to God for these four YAGM volunteers as they follow Christ and offer their lives and gifts. Pray also for their effectiveness, safety and joy throughout the coming year. They are models to all of us of how we might give ourselves in new ways and bring God's love and care to all around us.

Heavenly Father, thank you for the joy, comfort and love we enjoy in our congregation. We praise you for the experience of your presence with us. And now, Lord, we sense the call of your Spirit to reach out to the next generation and invite them into this joy, comfort and love. Guide us as we consider how



best to share our faith with others. Help us to listen – to each other – to those to whom you may be leading us – and especially to you. Thank you, Father. We remember that this is your Holy Church and that its future is safe in your hands. We pray these things in Jesus' name and in the power of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Having begun with prayer, I think the next step is to get together and share what we might be hearing in response to our prayer. To that end, everyone is invited to an evening forum on Wednesday night, October 28, at 7:00 p.m. at the church. We will brainstorm, share, and listen to ideas about how we might begin to approach this question. Everyone's ideas are important, so please come and share your thoughts.

This is exciting! It is important! Come and be part of the future. What will Grace Lutheran look like in 2025?
