One of the major missions of Grace Lutheran Church is the Uganda Aids Orphans project. Our congregation has been supporting the education of 21 young children who have lost their parents due to AIDS. With the help of Kenneth Kasule, our coordinator in Uganda, we have been able to provide these stu-

dents with tuition, books, health care and many other basic requirements for living. Kenneth is our eyes, arms and hearts in coordinating this important mission in Uganda. The following Christmas letter from Kenneth to the students was so heartfelt and touching that it is included in this issue of the *Voice of Grace* for your information.

To my lovely sisters and brothers in Christ!

I want to tell you that I love you all so much more than you can imagine. I have many things to think and worry about, but before I think about anything, I think about you. My biggest worry is how would it be and or how will it be if anything happens and I am not able to get the support to keep you in schools!

I don't want even to think about it, but it is important to think about it in order to have better plans for the future. Your education is very important to you and to our country Uganda, the country I have loved so much. You have the potential and all the intellectual capacities we need to get our country to another level and all you need is to have your brilliant ideas polished through schools by getting the education you need to realize your dreams, which are real for the development of our country Uganda. Some people are not aware of this yet, but I am glad that I know this already.

When I was very young, I was not very close to my God. With time, I got to realize how wrong I was! Luckily, I was able to under-

stand that it was never late, and I turned back to my God and decided to work hard and I loved reading the Bible very much. When I joined the university, I read the Bible in the university library (I did not have my own by that time). Proverbs 19 vs 1 says "it is better to be poor, but honest than to be a lying fool." Verse 17 says "When you

give to the poor, it is like lending to the Lord, and the Lord will pay you back." I was very encouraged with these readings from the Bible and that is the reason I have you all and try as much as I can to see you going through your education trend. It is my pleasure if I have been of help to any of you. In my life I came to believe that I can't fix my hopes and dreams to any one, not even to my biological parents, but to God. From Our Pastor:

"The Still, Small Voice of Love"

A blessed Epiphany to each of you! It was a glorious Advent and Christmas season and that glory continues as we celebrate the revealing of Jesus Christ to the world during the liturgical season of Epiphany. This is the season when we remember the arrival of the Magi at

Jesus' birthplace and their gifts. We hear about the coming of the light in our Epiphany readings even as we wait for the blessed light of longer days and shorter nights. The season of Epiphany is framed by some of my favorite Scripture readings. At the beginning of Epiphany we read about the baptism of Jesus and we hear God speak from the heavens, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased" (Matt. 3:17). On the last Sunday of Epiphany we hear the report of the Transfiguration when Jesus went up the mountain with Peter, James and John and was changed, transfigured, right before their eyes. Again, at that time, God's voice is heard from the cloud, saying, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with him I am well pleased; listen to him" (Matt 17:5). Those wonderful words form bookends to our celebration of Epiphany.

God spoke those same words to each of us at our baptism. And God continues to speak those words to us every single day. God says to you, "You are my child, my beloved, with you I am well pleased." We can spend a life time living into those words and really understanding God's unconditional love for us.

I am reading two delightful daily devotional books this year. The first is *My Utmost for His Highest* by Oswald Chambers. This is an insightful and challenging book that I have read a number of times before and it is good to get back to it. The second is *Bread for the Journey*, a compilation of excerpts from the writing of Henri Nouwen, one of my favorite authors. I would like to share a recent reading from *Bread for the Journey* that connects to this Epiphany theme of God's words for us.

The Still, Small Voice of Love

Many voices ask for our attention. There is a voice that says, "Prove that you are a good person." Another voice says, "You'd better be ashamed of yourself." There is also a voice that says, "Nobody really cares about you," and one that says, "Be sure to become successful, popular, and powerful." But underneath all these often very noisy voices is a still, small voice that says, "You are my Beloved, my favor rests on you." That's the voice we need most of all to hear. To hear that voice, however, requires special effort; it requires solitude, silence, and a strong determination to listen.

That's part of what prayer is, solitude, silence, and listening to the voice that calls us, "my Beloved." My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, may you hear that wonderful voice today and every day for the rest of your eternal life.

Grace food bags are available for you to fill and leave by the front door of the church. Once filled may you take another bag to bring again the following week or whenever you are able.



On the first day of the new year, Patt Roche, Diane, and I served dinner at the winter homeless shelter. Tucked into the back basement of the American Legion Hall. the shelter is the result of a remarkable effort by a few individuals and by many Port Townsend churches and civic organizations. It meets some very basic needs for those without much: hearty food and a warm, safe place to sleep during the long Port Townsend winter.

The shelter is filled with cots. The guests pile most of their belongings at the foot of their bed, to be hefted out at 8:00 a.m. in the morning, then carried around throughout the day until the shelter reopens at 4:00 p.m.

We served up chili, cole slaw, and brownies that New Year's evening. A quiet group of mostly middle-aged men (and one woman) lined up and silently dished up their food. They sat at tables and chatted while they ate.

A man with a long white beard sat alone. A tall younger man sat down next to him and said, "Arnie, what are you going to do after the shelter?"

The older man was silent.

The younger man persisted, "Do you have any plans?"

"I just want to go home," the older man said, staring at his



plate.

"Where is home?"

"I just want to go home," the man repeated.

The younger man, clearly down on his own luck, put his arm around the older man's shoulder. He thought for a minute and finally said, "Well, maybe some of us can help you find where that home is."

The spirit of Christ is very clear in places like this shelter...

Council Highlights

December 14, 2010

Council approved \$250.00 to be sent to the synod for October synod support payment.

Discussion on repairs needed to the organ. The music and worship committee will do further research and council will revisit the matter in January.

Council reviewed the 2011 draft budget presented by Vice President Roberta Bymers. Roberta will make the revisions presented and the council will approve a proposed budget at the January 9, 2011, meeting to go to the congregation for consideration. Mark Dembro will be meeting with church groups to discuss stewardship.

The audit committee will get an annual audit underway after the first of the year.

Pastor Coe presented a breakdown of existing memorial funds and presented a plan to combine the funds into one fund except for those accounts that have specific designations as to how the money is to be spent. The council approved a policy on the use of memorial funds.

Peace Lutheran Fellowship has asked that Grace be their congregation of record. Pastor Coe is looking into further details but it appears that there is little impact on our congregation to do so and we want to help them out as much as we can.

Karen Swanson-Woolf has volunteered to be the columbarium coordinator.

Roger Mills will work with Crissy to pick out a new computer and software for her office.

January 11, 2010

Council approved \$300.00 to be sent to the synod for January synod support payment and approved automatic payment of \$300 per month unless council votes otherwise.

Council discussed organ repairs. This item will be included in the long range planning for future items.

After being circulated among groups within the congregation, the proposed 2011 budget is ready for presentation at the January 23 Grace semi-annual meeting.

Last year, members and others contributed approximately \$51,000 additionally to outside charities through designated offerings.

Treasurer reported that a new computer for the secretary has been purchased.

At his request, the executive committee will do a mid-year employment evaluation on Pastor Coe.

The executive committee will meet to review possible capital projects (mostly presented by the design review committee) plus work that needs to be done to repair the organ and put together a prioritization of projects to be reviewed and adopted by the council

high school. He spent time in Alaska and continues to play an awesome guitar to this day. Hear


Pastor Bill share his faith walk. Enjoy some good ol' Gospel music by the Motion
