Council Highlights

The council discussed a letter from the City of Port Townsend regarding city owned property adjacent to the church land. It was decided that a letter would be sent to the city council expressing our interest in the process. The membership will monitor the proceedings without comment at this time.

The council approved the recommendation of the nominating committee to not fill the positions of Minister of Evangelism, Minister of Education and Youth and the Youth Representative, thus reducing the size of the council temporarily. The duties for these positions will be performed by volunteers throughout the congregation but will not be a part of the church council.

The council decided that the Gideons will not be invited to make a presentation at Grace.

The semi-annual congregational meeting will be June 26, 2011.

Funds were received for two memorials presided over by Pastor Coe for non-church members. A portion of the funds will be used for reimbursement of the cost of printing the bulletins, and the balance will go into the Pastor's Emergency Fund. GLC




From Our Pastor:

"Matthias Grunewald Resurrection"

Resurrection - I keep coming back to resurrection this Easter season - and what could be better to come back to. What does Iesus' resurrection mean for us. The resurrection is dramatic proof of all that Jesus teaches. Jesus predicts his death and resurrection multiple times; then, it all happens just as he predicted. Because this most important fact is true, we can also depend on the rest of what Jesus taught us. The power of resurrection ripples through all we do and say. We believe that our earthly death is not the end of our life. After our death we will be raised by the power of God to new life - resurrection life. That old threat of death making everything meaningless no longer has any power over us. Rather, everything and everyone has meaning, eternal meaning. Resurrection means that we will be reunited with loved ones who have gone before us and will come after us in faith. The pain that we know at the loss of a loved one is temporary and we will be with them again. Resurrection means that a day will come when our sinful nature will be finally and permanently removed and our God-filled spiritual nature will rule our lives. Won't that be wonderful!

Of course, we don't know all the details of resurrection, but what we do know is that Jesus was raised from the dead on Easter morning and because of that we too will be raised. We know that this is God's will for our lives. Finally, most importantly and most wonderfully, we know that if it is God's will for us it will be good – good indeed.






From Our President:

"Begin With The End in Mind Habit 2"

I would like to share some of my thoughts about the 7 *Habits of Highly Effective People,* by Stephen R. Covey, and how I like to apply these habits to my spiritual life.

My last article was about being proactive. In this article, I would like to explain the second habit, "Begin with the end in mind."



Take the construction of a home, for example: You create it in every detail before you ever hammer the first nail into place. You get a very clear idea of what kind of house you want including everything you need to make this the perfect home. Even the most talented architect would have a mental creation of the home prior to the physical creation.

I believe that we can do the same thing with our faith life. Our mental creation would be the desire to have a relationship with Christ. The physical creation would be how we want to live within that relationship and how we can achieve that goal. Then, with our mental and physical creations in place, we can begin to do those things that will bring us closer to Christ in our daily lives.

In my last article I wrote about the "Circle of Influence," in which we find those things that impact our lives the most. Whatever is at the center of your life will be the source of your security, guidance, wisdom and power. If we are Christ centered, that is where we gain our sense of worth, our identity, and our emotional anchor.

A personal mission statement is a very effective way to begin a spiritual relationship. Following is just a sample of things that could be in a personal mission statement: Determine what the priorities are in your life, seek divine help, listen twice as much as you speak, and decide what you value. The mission statement is usually short and to the point. By reviewing your statement periodically, you can use it as a barometer to see if you are still on track.

According to author Stephen R. Covey, "It doesn't begin and end with the writing of a personal mission statement. It is, rather, the ongoing process of keeping your vision and values before you and aligning your life to be congruent with those most important things."

Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you at the proper time, casting all your anxiety upon Him, because He cares for you. - 1 Peter 5:6, 7

The city owns a large piece of property adjacent to the church and the parsonage. The city-owned property is outlined in yellow on the map and is referred to as the Cherry St. property. There is a great need for affordable housing in Jefferson County and the city has been working with many groups to find ways to encourage the construction of additional affordable housing units. The city officials have identified three properties that they are considering declaring surplus to city needs and making available for construction of such housing; one of those properties is the Cherry St. property. The Port Townsend City Council has held public hearings regarding this proposal

but has not made any final determinations as yet. Additional public comment will be taken at a council meeting on May 2 at 6:30 p.m. The city is willing to work with the church and the neighbors to address our needs and interests as long as the city can continue to meet its goals as well. Some of the options that may be considered are sale of a piece of the city property, lotline adjustments, property swaps among other options. The city manager will be meeting with representatives from the Grace Lutheran Church Council in the near future to discuss alternatives.
