Pastor's Message

It's no secret that Port Townsend lies, quite literally, at the end of the road. For some of us, that's a big part of why we love it here. That creates some inconveniences but the trade-offs largely work in our favor.

Geography, alongside widespread conscientiousness, has helped this area weather the COVID-19 pandemic better than most. But it can feel a bit isolating at times. On a recent trip to Berkeley for my last visit as a member of the advisory board to my alma mater, Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, colleagues asked me if I knew so-and-so or this person or that person, a mix of clergy and active lay leaders in the Southwestern Washington Synod. With very few exceptions, my answer was "No."



Part of the reason this served as my last trip to Berkeley is my hope to become more involved and engaged with local and regional partners in ministry. As a result, I chose not to renew for another term pn the PLTS board. On December 8, Grace Lutheran Church is tentatively scheduled to host my colleagues on the roster of pastors and deacons from the Olympic and Peninsula conferences for the Bishop's Advent Eucharist. The conferences span from Forks across Highway 101, over the Hood Canal Bridge and reach down into Belfair, where Grace veteran Julie Kanarr is pastor at Christ Lutheran Church and dean of the Peninsula Conference.

I am looking forward to it, in no small part because it's one of few opportunities there has been to connect with ministry partners from around the region since I arrived at Grace last July. A Bishop's Eucharist took place last Advent at Vinland Lutheran Church, which I attended, and just a handful of us turned out for the Under-45 Rostered Leaders conference in January at Seabeck. For lay folks, a spring series of Synod-hosted educational workshops including stops in Port Angeles and Tacoma were about it for opportunities to come together with fellow ELCA members and be church (physically) together.

More chances lie on the horizon as we emerge from the pandemic, with the first Bishop's convocation in three or four years slated for January in Seabeck. The first in-person Synod Assembly since 2019 when attendees re-elected Bishop Richard Jaech (who is also president of the PLTS advisory board) is on tap for May in Auburn. At the upcoming semi-annual meeting, delegates to the Synod Assembly will be chosen from Grace and I encourage you to pray and discern whether you might like to participate or have an idea of someone else to nominate who might be a good fit. Perhaps this is a chance you too may enjoy to see old friends or establish new contacts.

Meanwhile, closer to home, the December 8 Eucharist is set to come to Grace for little more reason than Pastor Russ Britton, our Olympic Conference dean serving at Dungeness Valley Lutheran Church, called and asked and I said, "Yes." Our recent visit for a Q&A with the Port Townsend Police Department came about similarly. My dear friend and colleague, Pastor Dan Tisdel, of St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Roswell, New Mexico, said one of the greatest things about this work is having opportunities arise and just saying "Yes" to things. I pray as (gasp!) a new year lies just around the corner, to have a lot more chances to say "Yes" and see where God leads after that.

As the Epistle to the Colossians (4:5) instructs, "Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity."

Jesus' vision


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God's Work, Our Hands Day for this year was spent cleaning up our own space. Thanks to everyone who worked so hard that day both inside and out.
