Pastor's Message

Jesus Christ, you are the light of the world. The light no darkness can overcome.

You read this with the melody of Holden Evening Prayer resounding in your head, didn't you?

If so, fair enough. It echoes in my mind throughout much of the Advent season, not just when we sing it together. Not just in the minutes before the service would start or as I would sometimes hum it as I walked home afterward.

We will be back in a "Holden season" soon enough. Believe it or not, Lent is lurking not too far around the corner.

Until then, let there be light.

There's a little more in each day. There has been ever since the last night Holden Evening Prayer was scheduled at Grace, which coincided with the winter solstice, the longest night of the year.

The increasing natural light is helpful to us. Vitamin D, biological rhythms and all that.

But the light of Christ provides a much greater lift.

The birth of Jesus is the incarnation of God with us. God come to live among us. Showing up in the dark of night and providing a light that cannot be extinguished.

His light draws us to him. Just as the Magi were drawn to him. Just as the thousands who came to hear him preach and fulfill God's Word were drawn to him.

There's a reason so many medieval artists honed techniques to portray light around Christ. It draws the focus of our eyes and attention to him. In addition to the skill of the artists in reproducing the effects of light, the architecture of great cathedrals were sometimes designed to illuminate particular paintings or sculptures on specific days of the liturgical calendar and/or at specific times of day devoted to prayer.

When Grace hosted clergy from across the Peninsula from Belfair to Forks early last month for the Bishop's Eucharist, it warmed my heart to hear from colleagues who had either never visited our sanctuary or had not done so in many years. Bishop Richard Jaech introduced the worship service with recognition that the space reflects so well the place where we live, with its vivid color and inspiration that included imagery from the surrounding sea.

The way the light plays in the space, whether due to the time of day or the season or some combination thereof, draws our attention. The design centers the cross of Christ and when I lift up the host and the chalice as we celebrate communion, I am often reminded of the sentiments of my professor of historical theology, Dr. Michael Aune. The Eucharist should engage all our senses, not the least of which is the ability to see where Christ promises to be truly present, in the bread and wine, his body and blood.

I invite you to pay attention to the light of Christ in these first days of 2023, wherever and however it shows up. As we are the body of Christ, we should expect to see his light among us. In our worship, in our fellowship, in our service and in our walk together as followers of the path God has set out before us. I pray that we may faithfully bear that light as he continues to draw the world to him and his everlasting love and grace.

While it may not tackle the issue as to why we have hungry people, it *does* address the immediate need. I believe this is where we are best serving our Lord.

My heartfelt thanks to all who participated in this project, and a special thanks to Jeni and Jim Little who put this all together with a smile. You truly were epitomizing "Gods's Work, Our Hands."


October brought the Blessing of the animals; Pastor Appreciation Day...

Quilters Hold Silent Auction Fundraiser for Lutheran World Relief

The Quilters were given this quilt unfinished. Now completed, it could be yours. The bidding will open Sunday, January 22, and close February 12. The Bid Sheet is posted in the fellowship hall near the quilt.

This quilt would make a lovely wall hanging, lap quilt, or Valentine gift. The provenance is unknown, but it was likely made in Jefferson County between 1990 and 2010.

Technical detail: Most of the quilt is hand-pieced and hand-quilted, made of 100% cotton fabric and thread. The backing is a solid white cotton and the quilting design, mostly hand-quilting, can be seen on the back. This quilt's combination of an inner border of traditional piecing compliments the hand-stitched appliqué. Finely appliquéd, the central floral motif and the floral border displays the skill of the maker who invisibly sewed the design with 12-16 stitches per inch.

Design: The central floral arrangement is surrounded by a basket weave pattern, machine-pieced, and set on point within three borders. The central motif is accented by the limb, floral buds, and birds perched on the boughs in each corner of the block. The frame, comprised of on-point pink squares on a green ground is proportionate to the design. Finishing the design is the appliquéd border which was carefully planned to reflect and echo the central motif and flow in a gentle wave. The maker's choice of color is charming, particularly the red fabric chosen for the four birds and the gradation of green color within the basket weave section.

Our Christmas celebration included good food and white elephant gifts. The tree was a knockout!


